Postdoctoral Fellow Spotlight

*Emmanuel Julceus, MD, MPH, Department of Epidemiology and

Tell us a bit about yourself, your education, and how it led you to USC.

I completed a Doctorate in Medicine and a Specialization in Family Medicine at the State University of Haiti. Working at a teaching hospital in rural Haiti managed by the non-governmental organization Zanmi Lasante (Partners In Health), I saw too many patients in advanced disease

stages or with complications that could have been prevented if other non-medical factors such as food, sanitation, health education, travel time to healthcare service were addressed. I felt the need for additional training to act upstream and affect a larger part of the population. This led me to earn a Certificate in Epidemiology from the Field Epidemiology Training Program of Haiti and a Certificate in Global Health Delivery from Harvard University. In 2019, I received the prestigious Fulbright Scholarship for faculty development, allowing me to earn a Master of Public Health in Epidemiology at the University of South Carolina. After working as a research analyst, I was delighted to transition to a postdoctoral fellow at USC under Dr. Angela Liese, focusing on the effects of food insecurity and other social determinants of health on the physical and mental health of youth and young adults with diabetes. My most profound conviction is that health is a human right and a precious collective good.

How would you describe your current global health research?

My global health research highlights the intersection between social determinants of health and cancer. I received a grant from the Training Programs in Epidemiology and Public Health Interventions Network (TEPHINET) in 2020 to improve cancer surveillance in Haiti. From the nationwide database created with this project, in partnership with the Field Epidemiology Training Program of Haiti, we are studying national trends, access to treatment, and differences in outcomes by sociodemographic groups. In addition, I

am collaborating with my colleagues at Zanmi Lasante (Partners In Health in Haiti) to assess the impact of a group education program and community outreach activities such as home visits, on biopsychosocial health conditions of people with diabetes.

How has your time at USC prepared you for your future career path?

During my epidemiology degree at USC, I found it really fruitful that the faculty members conveyed different perspectives in terms of the US vs. international situation, high-income vs. low-income settings, etc., particularly in certain classes like public health surveillance, infectious disease epidemiology, and social epidemiology. Moreover, I benefited from the emphasis placed on analytical and scientific writing skills during class projects and graduate research assistantships. Thanks to my postdoctoral fellowship, I feel ready for my future career because, with Dr. Angela Liese and her multidisciplinary team of experienced collaborators, I have successfully broadened my scope of complex analysis, enriched my data management skills, enhanced my scientific writing, and improved my grant writing skills. All are essential tools to be an outstanding epidemiologist with a considerable impact on the health of at-risk populations.

What do you recommend to current students at USC that are interested in global health?

At USC, there are plenty of students, faculty, and staff with experience in global health. Be open, talk about your interests with your fellow students and your professors. They might be able to offer or suggest some opportunities, refer you to someone else, or offer valuable advice on the matter. In addition, I encourage you to attend global health events such as the Global Health Visiting Scholar Seminar and the International Student and Global Health Forum, where you can learn more about ongoing global health initiatives and meet people with similar interests. And once you find an opportunity, it is essential to learn more about the context of the population, be culturally aware, and empower people.

Nature published a commentary by leading nutrition experts on some of the lethal consequences of the abrupt dismantling of the US Agency for International Development and other announced reductions in funding from high-income countries. The commentary highlighted especially the consequences for severely malnourished children.

The journal *Science* published a report calling attention to the *Nature* commentary. **Dr. Edward Frongillo** had corresponded with the reporter and was mentioned in the report. The report mentions the USAID Integrated Nutrition project in Nepal, a large project for which Dr. Frongillo led an impact evaluation and three of USC's doctoral students contributed research.
